Thank you to all whanau who responded to the parking and transport survey earlier this year. A small group, including members of the board, has been formed to make improvements to ensure the safety of our tamariki based on your feedback. This group met with Auckland Transport earlier this term, and have come up with a plan to make positive changes, particularly to Kokiri St. We hope to see some changes in the coming year. Some of the ideas we discussed with AT were additional signage and whether a dedicated pick up/drop off zone would be possible.

The bike track has proven to be very popular, and we're pleased to hear that it gets a lot of use



outside school time too. Unfortunately, since it went

in, we've also seen drainage issues leading to a noticeable decline in the state of the field. With such a wet year this is somewhat to be expected, and we've seen that other school fields in the area are also in a poor state simply because of the amount of rain. However, the board has had several conversations about the impact of the bike track on drainage, we've taken advice on options for improving it, and have agreed on a plan. The main actions are a programme of rolling, draining, weed spraying and re-seeding. We expect these steps will improve the field's condition over time, and with continued maintenance, and hopefully less wet weather, the field should return to its previous state.



The board thanks Peter and all the staff for providing our tamariki another great year of learning and new experiences, and we congratulate our learners on another milestone in their school journey.
